Anyone who is at least 14 years old and interested in using our collection can sign up for a Newberry reader's card. Get started at requests.newberry.org.


VISITING THE READING ROOMS



Parking


Garage parking is available within a few blocks of the Newberry. We validate tickets for discounted parking at the garage located at 100 West Chestnut Street.

ABOUT OUR GENEALOGY COLLECTION

National in scope, our genealogy collection is especially useful if you're searching for ancestors in Chicago, Illinois, and the Midwest.

Strengths of the collection include: family histories, local histories for counties and cities nationwide, city directories, biographical resources, vital record indexes, censuses, military records and histories, land ownership maps, and immigration information.

We also have complete runs of many state and county historical and genealogical publications.

Here are some highlights:

Genealogies

You'll find more than 20,000 published genealogies; colonial America and New England are especially well represented. Many rare titles covering gentry and noble families of the British Isles are also included.

Local Histories

The Newberry holds county, city, town, church, and other local histories from all regions of the United States, as well as from Canada and the British Isles. We have comprehensive collections of New England town histories, in addition to county histories from the Midwest and Mid-Atlantic states.

Genealogical Source Material

Published indexes, abstracts, and transcriptions of pre-20th-century records of birth, death, and marriage, as well as probate, deed, court, tax, and cemetery records form an important segment of the Newberry's genealogy collection—primarily from the area of the Mississippi Valley to the Eastern Seaboard, as well as from Canada and the British Isles.
